




Welcoming a New Pet

Pet Proof your Home

Before bringing your new pet home, ensure your living space is safe and pet friendly.

Whether you're bringing home a canine companion or feline friend, **remove any potential hazards** like toxic plants, harmful chemicals, and objects small enough to be swallowed.

Secure loose cords and chewable items—like shoes—and set up a safe, quiet space. Moving to a new home can be overwhelming, and having a place to retreat and decompress will help avoid reactivity. This is also important when choosing where to place your dog's crate or your cat's litterbox, as both animals prefer peace and privacy while using these.





For Your Dog

GATE OFF AREAS

Safety or baby gates help facilitate introductions to different areas of the home and prevent access to stairs and certain rooms.

CONSIDER CRATE TRAINING

Crates support potty training efforts and provide a safe space while you're away from home. Size the crate for your pup to grow into and add a pad or bedding inside for comfort.

SECURE YOUR YARD (IF YOU HAVE ONE!)

Ensure your yard is fully, securly fenced. Check for holes and escape routes and consider investing in self-locking gates.

For Your Cat

KEEP BREAKABLES OUT OF REACH

Cats are known for curiosity and climing ability so keep fragile and valuable items out of reach or secured.

SECURE WINDOWS AND BALCONIES

All windows and balconies should be closed or securely screened at all times to prevent dangerous falls or escapes into the wild.

ELIMINATE POTENTIAL HIDING SPOTS

While cats need a comfortable place to retreat when overwhelmed, it can be scary when they can't be found. Clear out small spaces or hiding spots you're unable to reach.
